Founded in 1989, Stefan Behnisch's firm has designed several of the world's most distinctive and ecologically-sensitive buildings, including the Institute of Forestry and Nature Research in the Netherlands, Norddeutsche Landesbank in Hannover, Germany and the Genzyme Center in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The Genzyme Center was especially well received and won numerous accolades, including the Northeast Green Building Award, the Top Ten Green Project from the American Institute of Architects and the Wastewise Program Champion Award from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

In 2006, Harvard chose Behnisch Architekten to design the university's state-of-the-art science complex, which will house the Harvard Stem Cell Institute and other cross-departmental science initiatives.

Behnisch frequently lectures at universities and industry symposiums. An advocate and educator of Sustainable Building Design, he has been a visiting lecturer at the University of Stuttgart, an external examiner at the University of Portsmouth in the United Kingdom and at Norway's Bergen Architecture School, a member of the Royal Institute of British Architects and the Federation of German Architects, and a board member of Congress of International Modern Architects. He was a guest professor at the University of Texas in Austin in 2001 and an Eero Saarinen Visiting Professor at Yale University School of Architecture in 2005, 2006 and 2008.

Stefan Behnisch studied architecture at the University of Karlsruhe and economics at Ludwig Maximilians University. He is the son of celebrated architect E.H. Gunter Behnisch, whose design credits include the Olympic Stadium in Munich.

Renee Cheng is an associate professor and head of the School of Architecture in the College of Design at the University of Minnesota. She taught at the University of Michigan and the University of Arizona before joining the faculty at the University of Minnesota in January of 2002. She was named director of design for the Department of Architecture in 2002 and head of the department in 2004.

Cheng has been recognized for teaching excellence at the local, state and national levels with awards such as the AIA Arizona Educator of the Year (2000) and the ACSA/AIAS New Faculty Teaching Award (1996).

Her research involves documenting case studies of buildings that integrate design with emerging technologies. She is been tracking several large-scale projects by Frank Gehry and Associates as well as smaller scale CAD-CAM work done by firms such as SHoP Architects, A.R.O. and Tripyramid. She is interested in ways that design ideas are mediated as they become built reality.

A registered architect since 1991, her professional experience includes work for Pei, Cobb, Freed and Partners and Richard Meier and Partners before founding Cheng-Olson Design with her partner Eric Olson in 1992.

Cheng graduated from Harvard's Graduate School of Design after receiving her A.B. with honors in psychology from Harvard College.

An architect, scholar and critic, Xavier Costa is dean of the Universitat Pompeu Fabra's ELISAVA Design School. Created in 1961 by a group of leading Catalan architects, designers and theoreticians, ELISAVA is Spain's leading design school, known for its innovative, cross-disciplinary line of training and research.

Costa is also the director of the Metropolis Postgraduate Program in Architecture and Urban Culture at the Universitat Politecnica de Catalunya, and curator of architecture at the Mies van der Rohe Foundation, also in Barcelona. Costa's work combines teaching and research in architecture, design and urbanism.

His recent research and publications reflect an interdisciplinary interest in architectural theory and urban studies, including "Situationists: Art, Politics, and Urbanism" (1998); "Contemporary Spanish Architecture" (2002); "Wiel Arets: Works, Projects, Writings" (2002); "Metropolis: Ciudades, Territorios, Paisajes" (2004); and "Hans Hofmann: The Chimbote Project" (2004). Costa is also known for his curatorial work in architecture at the Mies van der Rohe Foundation and the Museum of Contemporary Art in Barcelona, in addition to collaborations with La Biennale, Venice, and The Museum of Modern Art, New York.

He has previous teaching experience at Cornell University, the Architectural Association in London, Columbia University, the Berlage Institute and the University of Pennsylvania. He has also lectured at Harvard University and ETH Zurich.

Costa received a degree in architecture from the Universitat Politecnica de Catalunya and a master's degree and Ph.D. degree in architecture from the University of Pennsylvania.



Elizabeth Cromley, PhD

Elizabeth Cromley is an architectural historian with a special interest in the common or vernacular architecture of the United States. She is a professor of architectural history at Northeastern University in Boston. Cromley has published books and articles on a wide range of topics including Catskills resorts, New York City apartment buildings, Native American objects used in interior decoration and aspects of home renovation. She is currently completing a book on the historical development of kitchens and other food spaces in the architecture of American houses. Her research on the architectural history and meaning of domestic spaces has earned her distinction in her field.

Prior to joining Northeastern University in 1997 as a professor and chair of the Department of Art and Architecture (1997-2001), she held academic positions at the State University of New York at Buffalo, University of California, Berkeley, CUNY's City College and Bronx Community College.

She is a founder and past president of the Vernacular Architecture Forum and a member of the Society of Architectural Historians. She has worked as a director, consultant or contributor for several architectural exhibitions by the Smithsonian Institution and the Whitney Museum.

Cromley earned a B.A. degree in art history from the University of Pennsylvania, an M.A. degree from New York University's Institute of Fine Arts and a Ph.D. degree from the City University of New York. She also earned a certificate from the Victorian Society Summer School in Britain.

Fisch, a leading researcher in solar energy, has been the director and founder of the Institute of Building Services and Energy Design (IGS) at the Technical University of Braunschweig (TU Braunschweig) since 1996. The IGS handles the entire spectrum of energy and climatic design in buildings. The main areas of activity are building technology, edificial physics as well as passive and active usage of solar energy for residential and office buildings. The IGS is supported by the German Federal Environmental Foundation, the Federal Ministry of Economics and Labor as well as other institutions in Germany.

Fisch also serves as professor of the Institute of Mechanical Services at TU Braunschweig. Prior to joining the university, he was a project manager at the Institute of Thermodynamics and Thermal Engineering (ITW) at the University of Stuttgart, where he worked on large-scale solar heating systems. Fisch has written numerous publications on the subject, two of which are "Solar City" and "Heating with the Sun."

Fisch received a doctoral degree from the University of Stuttgart's Institute of Thermodynamics and Thermal Engineering.

Daniel S. Friedman became the dean of the University of Washington's College of Architecture and Urban Planning in July 2006. He was previously the director of the School of Architecture at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) since 2003. During his tenure there, he developed the school's five-year strategic plan, secured its six-year accreditation, led the initiative for a new post-professional graduate degree in healthcare design, oversaw interior renovations to the Art and Architecture building, consulted on the campus master plan and chaired the Campus Design Review committee.

Prior to joining UIC, Friedman taught at the School of Architecture and Interior Design at the University of Cincinnati from 1990 to 2002, serving his last two years there as school director.

Friedman writes and lectures widely on professional ethics and education, public architecture, and twentieth century theory. He is the co-founder and past editor of Practices magazine and co-editor of Plumbing: Sounding Modern Architecture.

Friedman was elected to the College of Fellows of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) in 2001. He currently serves on the AIA Board Knowledge and the AIA Chicago board of directors. He is 2007 chair of the AIA College of Fellows' Latrobe Prize jury. In 2005, Friedman served as program chair of the AIA national convention. In addition, Friedman serves as a member of the Chicago Design Initiative.

Friedman holds a master's degree in architecture from the University of Wisconsin, and master and doctoral degrees in architectural theory from the University of Pennsylvania.

Oscar Harris is responsible for the firm's strategic vision and oversees all of the work bearing the name Turner Associates. For over 30 years, the firm has designed a multiplicity of projects, transforming the urban fabric of Atlanta and other major urban areas.

The firm is presently the Program Manager in the visioning, conceptualization, planning, design and project management of the new \$5.4 billion Atlanta Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport Expansion, the MARTA system in Atlanta, and many urban-complex design and planning projects from government centers, judicial complexes, schools, offices and communities. Harris has completed more than \$3 billion in successfully constructed projects. He has designed and planned projects in Georgia, Ohio, Alabama, Louisiana and Florida, with a focus on planning and design of communities. He is currently working on two major justice center complexes in Augusta and Atlanta, GA.

Harris is on the Board of Directors at Southern Polytechnic State University, in Atlanta, Georgia and is a Fellow for the Atlanta Studio for Creative Inquiry, where he works with high school children to introduce them to thinking creatively about the constructed environment. He also sits on the Advisory Board for Small Business for the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta. He was selected as the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce 2003 Small Business Person of the Year. In 2004, he was awarded the Bronze Medal from the American Institute of Architects for his contributions to the profession.

In June 2006, Harris was inducted nationally into the American Institute of Architects College of Fellows for his excellence in the practice of Architecture, and his life's work using his architectural practice and experience to mentor youth from under-served communities to foster a selection and pursuit of careers in architecture, engineering and construction.

He holds a B.A. from Lincoln University and a master's degree in architecture from Carnegie Mellon. In 2000, Carnegie Mellon presented him with the Prestigious Alumni Merit Award for Excellence.

Tod Hunt is a vice president and a director of the Elmhurst Corporation, a real estate development firm that owns and manages more than two million square feet of office and distribution space in the Pittsburgh region. Hunt currently serves as a board member of the Allegheny Cemetery Historical Association, the Carnegie Museums of Pittsburgh, the Carnegie Museum of Natural History, the Senator John Heinz Pittsburgh Regional History Center and the Shadyside Hospital Foundation. He joined the Carnegie Mellon Board of Trustees in 1996 and is currently a life trustee. He is a trustee and past president of his family's foundation, The Roy A. Hunt Foundation.

Hunt completed a B.A. degree in political science with emphasis on international affairs at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, in 1970. He later earned a master's degree in international administration from the School for International Training at Brattleboro, Vermont, and worked for the AFS International Scholarships in Argentina. Hunt is fluent in Spanish, French, Brazilian Portuguese and Italian.

Lars G. Lerup is an architect, designer, author and educator. He currently serves as dean and the William Ward Watkin Professor of the Rice University School of Architecture. His work focuses on the intersection of nature and culture in the contemporary American metropolis, and on Houston in particular. Before joining the Rice faculty in 1993, he was a professor of architecture at the University of California, Berkeley.

Lerup has lectured and exhibited extensively throughout the world and has published many books and essays. He is a board member of the Swiss Foundation for the International Institute of Architecture and of the Rice Design Alliance in Houston. He also serves on the Provost's advisory board for the faculty of Architecture, Landscape and Design at the University of Toronto.

Lerup received a distinguished professorship from the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture in 2003 and was named the Swedish-American Citizen of the Year in 2004 for his lifelong contributions to architectural education and practice. He also received the 2005 Educator of the Year Award from the Houston chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

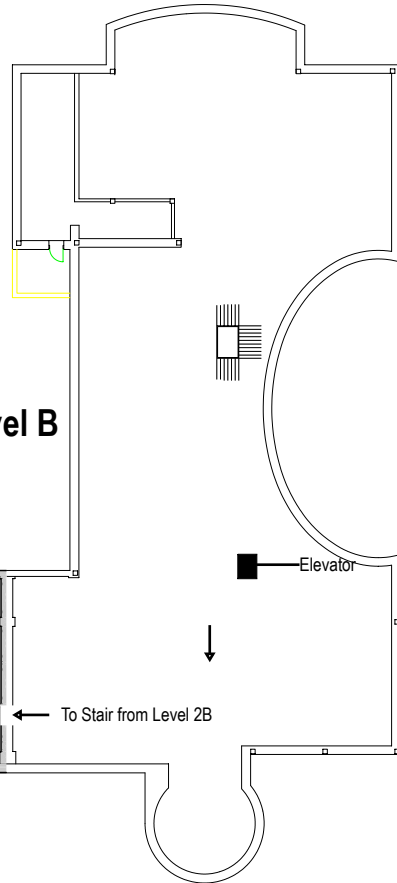

Simonds received her bachelor's degree in English literature from Middlebury College where she served as a term trustee for ten years.

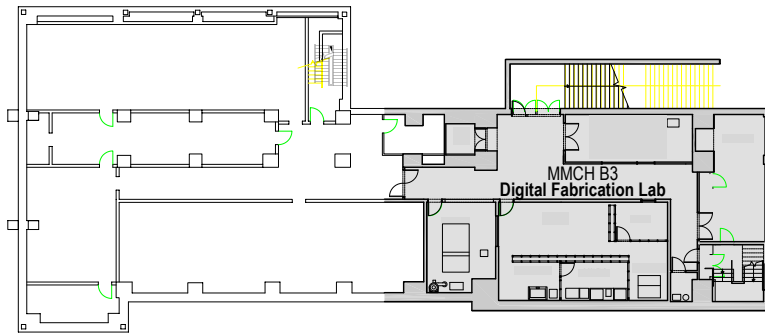
