# Frank Lloyd Wright Renewing the Legacy

OCTOBER 1, 2005–JANUARY 15, 2006

*Frank Lloyd Wright: Renewing the Legacy* brings together two iconic buildings by Frank Lloyd Wright, the Darwin D. Martin House (1905) in Buffalo, New York, and the H.C. Price Company Office Tower and Apartments (1956) in Bartlesville, Oklahoma. The exhibition presents Wright's original designs alongside new associated projects by New York-based Toshiko Mori and London-based Zaha Hadid, women recognized as visionary leaders in contemporary architecture.

Mori is to construct an elegant, glass-walled visitors center on the Martin House property. Concurrently, Hadid is designing a dramatic arts center, adjacent to the Price Tower, that responds to the site's contours. These designs and Wright's original projects are presented through drawings, models, furniture, decorative arts, film, and photographs.

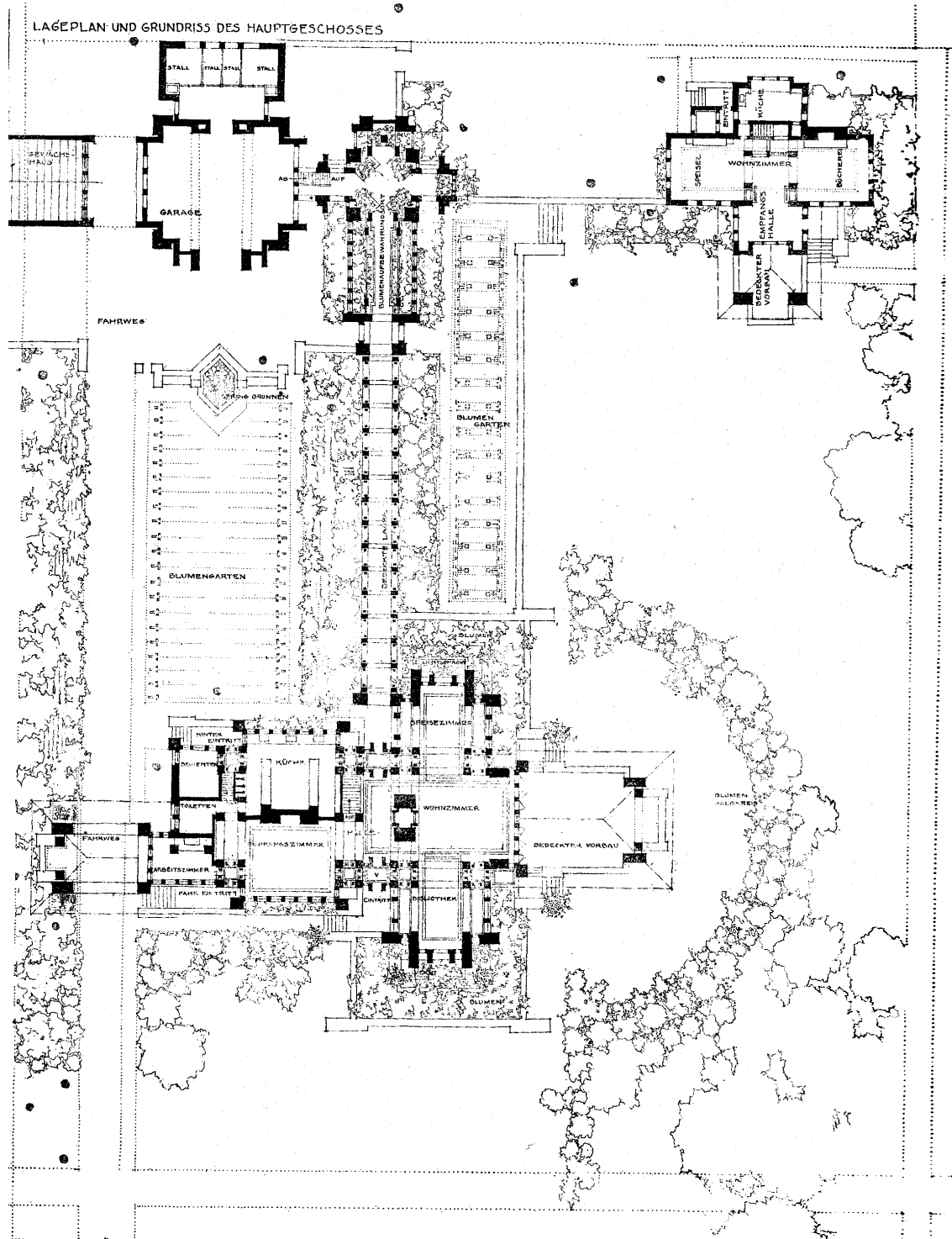

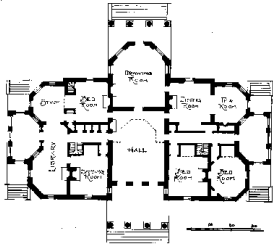

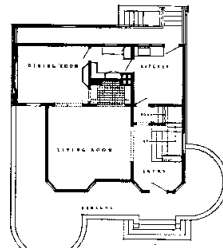

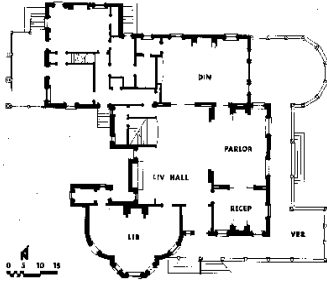
Monticello, Jefferson, ca. 1780



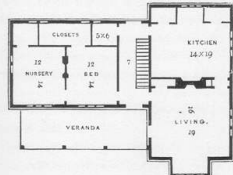

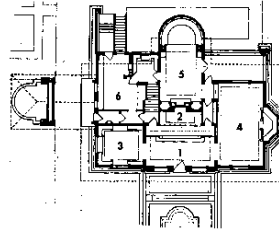
FLW Own House, 1889



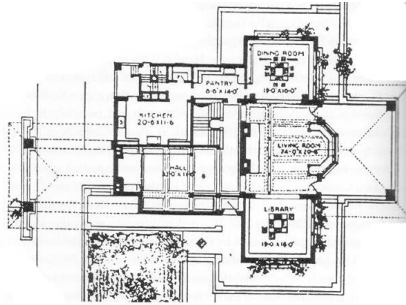
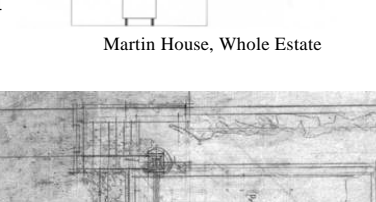
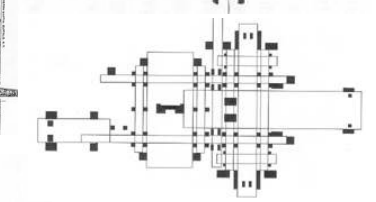
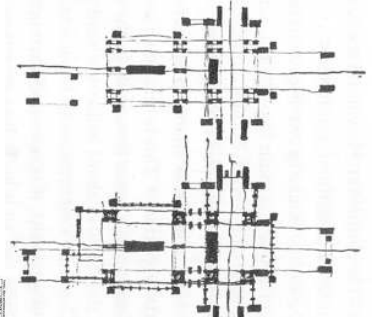
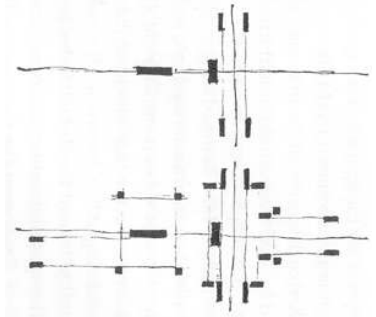

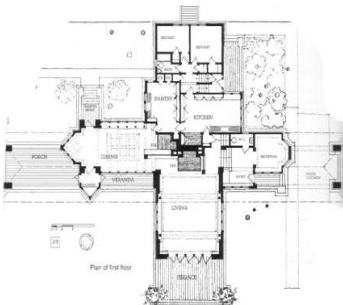

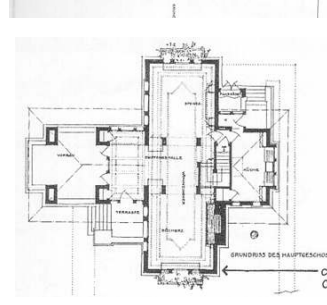

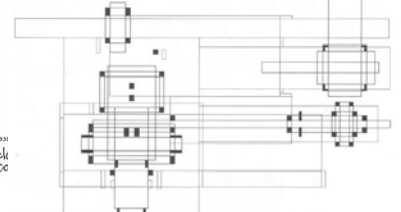
