NANCY GALBRAITH has been composing music since the late 1970's, creating instrumental and vocal sound praised for its rich harmonic texture, rhythmic vitality, emotional and spiritual depth, and wide range of expression. With major contributions to the repertoires of symphony orchestras, concert choirs, wind ensembles, chamber ensembles, and soloists, Galbraith plays a leading role in defining the sound of American contemporary classical music. The composer is also an accomplished pianist and organist and has composed a number of sacred choral and organ works in her years as a church music director and organist.

Galbraith resides in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, USA, where she is Professor and Chair of Composition at the Carnegie Mellon University School of Music, and holds the Virgil I. Heinz Professorship of Music endowed chair at CMU's College of Fine Arts.

BRIAN GILLING, as both pianist and conductor, has distinguished himself as an exceptionally versatile musician and collaborator. Performing across North America and Europe, he has garnered acclaim for his adept leadership and engaging performances of chamber music, art song, opera, and orchestral music. He has received praise for his "sure handed leadership" (New York Times) and his "thorough musicianship" (PGH in the Round). As music director, he has conducted the Loft Opera, Opera Saratoga, Undercroft Opera, Pittsburgh Opera, Opera Colorado, and the Washington Heights Chamber Orchestra. As pianist, he has performed with Opera Saratoga, the Berkshire Opera Festival, and Resonance Works. He is the pianist and cofounder of the award-winning Lila Quartet, and is pianist and music director of NAT 28. Brian has received bachelor and masters degrees from the Carnegie Mellon School of Music.

DANIEL NESTA CURTIS is a conductor and educator noted for his adventurous programming, interdisciplinary work, and advocacy for under-represented composers. He currently serves as Director of Orchestral Studies at Carnegie Mellon University and codirector of NAT 28 New Music, and was director of the Carnegie Mellon Contemporary Ensemble. Since 2012, Curtis has appeared as a guest conductor of a number of Pittsburgh ensembles including Quantum Theater, Resonance Works, Brass Roots, Chatham Baroque, Kamerton, and the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. Before his move to Pittsburgh, he was the Assistant Conductor of the Brooklyn Philharmonic (2011-2013), Associate Conductor of the Bleecker Street Opera Company, and Assistant Conductor of the Amor Artist Chorale in New York. Curtis received his BA from Amherst College (2008) and his MM in conducting from Carnegie Mellon University (2012).
