

Nancy Galbraith (b. 1951) has been composing music since the late 1970's, creating instrumental and vocal sound praised for its rich harmonic texture, rhythmic vitality, emotional and spiritual depth, and wide range of expression. With major contributions to the repertoires of symphony orchestras, concert choirs, wind ensembles, chamber ensembles, electroacoustic



ensembles, and soloists, Galbraith plays a leading role in defining the sound of American contemporary classical music. Galbraith resides in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania where she is Chair of Composition at the Carnegie Mellon University School of Music, and holds the Vira I Heinz Professorship of Music endowment. She is published by Subito Music.

Thomas Octave (b. 1983) is prized as a conductor, baritone, educator, concert producer, and church music director. As a conductor, he works in a wide variety of musical genres, including contemporary classical music, sacred music, theater, jazz, and ballet. Octave has presented music for the First Lady of Uganda and The Queen of Jordan upon their visits to the Pacem In Terris Institute. At Saint Procopius Abbey in Illinois, he presented a series of concerts for peace in the Holy Land, including the premiere of this album's "Novena." He has served as the assistant conductor of the Bach Choir in Pittsburgh and as Music Department Chair at St. Vincent's college in Pennsylvania. Octave has earned degrees in conducting and vocal performance from Carnegie Mellon University, Duquesne University, and holds a DMA in Sacred Music from the Graduate Theological Foundation in Oklahoma.
